

Scout Naturalist Program Summer 2001

Massawepie Scout Reservation Otetiana Council, B.S.A.

Learn to be a Scout Naturalist in our fun two-week summer camp program!

Do you enjoy exploring forest, field, and stream in search of animals and plants? Do you like teaching? Adult leaders, explorers, and scouts age13 and older, can participate in a two-week Scout Naturalist program at Massawepie Scout Reservation during the summer of 2001.

Our program will give you the skills needed to lead scouts to learn about nature during troop meetings and on camping trips that explore natural areas.

During the first week, you will sharpen your "self-taught naturalist" skills. On week two, learn how to be a wilderness guide as we canoe and backpack through the Cranberry Lakes Natural Area.

WEEK ONE: Camp Pioneer Learn naturalist skills as you:

• snorkel in a lake, wade in a stream, and walk through a "quaking bog" to study aquatic organisms.

• explore forests from ground floor to canopy.

• use field guides to identify plants, animals, and rocks of the Massawepie Lake area.

• mountain bike to unusual and remote natural areas.

• visit the Adirondack Museum at Blue Mountain Lake to learn about Northwoods history.

• learn about wildlife management and forestry from New York State Department of Environmental Conservation rangers.

Develop teaching & leadership skills as you:

• problem solve with scout naturalists on a simulated jungle trek.

- put together a "troop nature study prop box." (free materials!)
- lead a successful nature walk.
- build a self-guided nature trail.
- make nature fun by leading games that teach ecology concepts to scouts.

• gain ideas for conducting conservation projects in your community.

• hear Adirondack storytellers during evening campfires and learn to tell your own stories.

• plan the itinerary for our wilderness trip by examining maps,



guidebooks, and interviewing Adirondack residents.

WEEK TWO: Cranberry Lakes Wilderness Learn wilderness guide skills as you:

- refine your canoeing and backpacking skills.
- observe eagles, loons, beavers, deer, and snakes.
- visit a "Logging Days Ghost Town."
- keep a wildlife journal and sketchbook.
- develop stalking skills needed to get close to wildlife.
- prepare meals supplemented by edible wild plants.
- explore the wilderness at night to observe nocturnal animals.
- visit old-growth forests and walk under towering trees.

• learn camping techniques that will shorten the time spent in the camp site and give your group more time in the woods!

Scouts will be able to earn the following merit badges during both weeks of the program:

Bird Study Fish and Wildlife Management

Wilderness Survival

What's next after the Scout Naturalist Training?

You will meet with Marty to evaluate your skills and write a plan to use your training by serving as a naturalist for your scout troop.

You will be awarded the "loon patch".

As you serve as a Scout Naturalist, you can complete the requirements to earn the three patch strips: Interpreter, Conservationist, and Trip Leader.
